









Abs Development Organization for Woman and Child (ADO) is a well-established national humanitarian, non-governmental and non-profit developmental organization. ADO adopts a strong needs-based approach in its work in Yemen in order to reach the most vulnerable women, children, displaced and host communities in deprived rural areas located on the coast of Tihama. Since it was established in 1996, ADO has been striving for the sake of women and children. Through its distinctive presence, it has consolidated its multi-sectoral integrated response and continued to expand covering all outreach areas up to the present – 2023. Over 28 years, ADO has implemented more than 320 Developmental and Humanitarian projects; 55 ones are included in Education & Women Literacy Eradication sector, 54 are included within the Protection sector, 39 are within WASH, 42 projects in Health & Reproductive Health, 21 within Nutrition, 31others are within Food Security & Livelihood, 22 within Shelter and CCCM, 25 Empowering youth economically and socially and 31 of these projects aim at Women Empowerment & Promoting Gender. All in all, ADO reached approximately 7,000,000 beneficiaries until of 2023.



ADO FOUNDING IDEA

ADO was established to confute the discrimination against women and advocate for their rights. ADO was founded in 1996, and firstly named "Abs Feminist association" The idea of establishing ADO was developed by 5 women due, largely, to the suffering and difficulties faced by the women in the community. In 2011, Abs Feminist association was developed into Abs Development Organization. In the same year, male cadres joined ADO. So, the board of trustees became 9 members (4 men and 5 women.) In brief, ADO has gone through five important phases of expansion and development as follows:

The first stage (1996 – 1999):

ADO was named Abs Feminist association. It was providing its services exclusively for the local women and children at the level of Abs city and then at the level of Abs district;

The second stage (2000 - 2006):

The association was developed expanding its services at the governorate level to cover Hajjah, Al Hodeidah and Saada governorates;

The third stage (2007 - 2010):

The association was developed expanding its services at the governorate level to cover Hajjah, Al-Hodeidah, Saada, and Al-Mahweet governorates;

The fourth stage (2011– up to the present):

ADO changed from Abs Feminist association to "Abs Development Organization for Woman and Child (ADO) it has ever since expanded its services to cover many governorates at the level of the Republic of Yemen. It has become a leading organization working in 9 programmes in both sectors; Humanitarian & Emergency Response: (Health, Nutrition, WASH, SMC & FSL), as well as Development & Gender: (Protection/CP/GBV, Education and Microfinance advocating the cause of women and youths in promoting their rights in education, political and social participation.

SAFEGUARDING

ADO has always focused on safeguarding since the establishment. More recently, between the period of 2020 – 2023, ADO has attained a major advancement in enhancing understanding safeguarding responsibilities within its offices and programs. During that period, a committee was established at the level of the senior management to confidentially receives, verifies and then responds to such sensitive complaints.

The following are among the means ADO has endorsed to enhance safeguarding within its work:

- Internal CFM policy for ADO staff;
- Monthly safeguarding training;
- A policy of zero tolerance in safeguarding;
- Monthly close follow-up by immediate managers;
- Quarterly code of conduct assessment for all.

Furthermore, during 2023, ADO conducted a safeguarding threats assessment then took the necessary measures accordingly.


INTERNAL MONITORING

ADO is an independent not-for-profit CSO that is not affiliated with any other political and economic entity, and hence it takes its decisions independently in all matters intending to benefit its community of beneficiaries.

GOVERNANCE AND SENIOR MANAGEMENT OF ADO

ADO is governed by a board of trustees chaired by Dr. Aisha Thawab. This board is of five members (three females & two males) in which women constitute 60%. These members have a variety of backgrounds and experiences as they came from a variety of different parts in Yemen. Whereas the three ladies came from Tehama area, all other 2 members are came from different Governorates. The board has conducted 4 meetings recently during 2023 to discuss updates required for ADO strategic plan. ADO board is divided into two committees (Legislative & Policy Committee and the Executive Committee), while the monitoring and Inspection Committee is an independent committee.

Monitoring and Inspection Committee

This committee consists of a team leader with two other members whose main responsibilities are focused on internal auditing and risk management.

Executive Committee

This committee is made up of a team leader with two other members. The committee tasks include supervising the recruitment procedures for senior positions within ADO various departments, planning and supervising ADO program team.

ADO STAFF

Abs Development Organization for woman and child (ADO) ADO has 295 professional and specialized staff with high capabilities in planning, implementing and supervising achieve organization goals and delver high-quality services to the beneficiaries, which the organization boost their morale and trains them to ensure continues quality performance. ADO team consists of people with multiple and diverse specializations; There are more than 159 specialists in health and nutrition sector, 10 specialists in protection and gender, and 30 engineers. ADO team is distinguished by its high ability to work in remote, hard to reach and dangerous areas. The accumulative total number of the employees at ADO, The cumulative number of employees until 2023 is 3,410 employee.



ADO VOLUNTEERS

During 2023, 550 male and female volunteers contributed to the provision of assistance through their rapid and efficient access to the most impoverished people. ADO as a humanitarian local organization, evaluate volunteers' major humanitarian roles. Whether through administrative voluntary work or by active participation in the field. ADO allows these volunteers to learn new experiences and skills. Volunteering opportunities are offered to most segments of youth including graduates, without considering practical experiences to help them obtain new opportunities and experiences in the future. The accumulative total number of ADO volunteers has reached 5,050 up to the year 2023.





ADO SECTORS

ADO operates in two primary sectors: Gender & Development Sector and Humanitarian Aid Sector.

The following sectors fall under the umbrella of Gender & Development (Agriculture and Production Sectors, Economic Infrastructure and Services, Educational facilities development, Governance & community participation, Health facilities development, Gender & Peace, Environment and climate change, Advocacy & Networking).

On the other hand, Humanitarian Aid is divided into the following sectors (Food Security and Livelihood (FSL), Nutrition, Health, Shelter/NFIs, CCCM, Protection, Child Protection (CP), Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM), Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH), and Education) Each sector will be explained separately.





DEVELOPMENT AND GENDER SECTOR



Gender and peace

This sector aims to implement projects that supporting women's rights and gender equality, empowering both women and girls, promoting peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, and providing access to justice for all.



Environment and climate change

This sector mainly aims to support and implement projects that mitigate the effects of climate change and support adaptation, as well as those projects that aim to provide renewable energy and encourage its use, such as solar and wind energy, etc. This sector also aims to support and implement projects that achieve sustainable urban development in the long term.

Agriculture & Production Sectors

Interventions in this sector include all contributions to all directly productive fields, including: agriculture, fishing and afforestation; extractive and manufacturing industries; processing of food and other agricultural products; cottage industry and handicrafts; trade and tourism.

Many joint income-generating agricultural projects have been implemented between ADO and farmers in Hajjah and Hodeidah.



Economic Infrastructure & Services

This sector aims to assist networks, utilities and services that facilitate economic activity, including: production and distribution of energy; equipment or infrastructure for road, rail, water and air transport; banking and financial services; and business other services.

Educational Facilities Development

This sector aims to support the education field in terms of providing appropriate infrastructure and means and supporting all types of education, including basic education, secondary education, and post-secondary education; and scholarships. It also aims to support education in specialized fields, such as agriculture or energy.

In 2021-2022, 7 schools were rehabilitated and solar energy were provided.





Governance & Community Participation

This sector aims to provide optimal support for the public sector and civil society, including: public sector policy and management; public financial management; domestic revenue mobilization; legal and judicial development; elections; media and free flow of information; human rights; ending violence against women and girls; social protection level improvement; employment creation; housing policy, culture and recreation.

Health Facilities Development

This sector encompasses a multitude of interventions aimed at addressing various health challenges faced by the community. These efforts range from enhancing the infrastructure of health facilities to improving the quality of healthcare services delivered.

In 2021-2022, 6 health facilities were rehabilitated in the districts of Al-Khawkhah, Hays, Al-Marawa'a, Abas and Aslam in Hajjah and Al Hudaydah governorates.



Advocacy and Networking

Overview:

ADO has always been marked, since its inception in 1996, by being a field-based organization operating in remote rural areas striving to support the Yemeni community, particularly the most vulnerable groups from women and children. Furthermore, it is supporting all humanitarian associations and/or organizations in many activities pertaining to sensitive issues within the community.

ADO is actively participating in all clusters and had been leading some, ADO also believes in the localization of humanitarian work. It has participated in many conferences in this regard. With the participation of 10 NGOs, it has established an advocacy union for Yemeni local NGOs known as the localization of humanitarian work Initiative in Yemen.

Additionally, ADO had been one of the organizations that participated in the joint statement at the session number 77 of the UN General Assembly. Over and above, ADO is one of the first local NGOs that has called for implementing the Grand Bargain Agreement. It does believe in localizing humanitarian assistance as relevant and an essential matter in this respect. As a local Non-Governmental Organization (NGO), ADO believes that localizing humanitarian aid is so essential because NGOs are so close from its local community needs.





ADO is a representative of civil society organizations in the International Advocacy Group AWG:

During 2022 ADO was nominated to be a representative of all civil society organizations (CSOs) in Yemen to represent them before international organizations embracing all humanitarian issues of society in the International Advocacy Group (AWG), which holds periodic meetings to discuss the most sensitive humanitarian issues in society related to humanitarian work in Yemen; It relates to humanitarian work in Yemen, whether these issues concern an individual in society, a group of individuals, or advocate for the causes and rights of community organizations themselves.

ADO part of the strategic Advisory Group (GPC -SAG)

ADO was selected out of all CSOs working in the Republic of Yemen to be part of the Strategic Advisory Group (GPC - SAG) for the upcoming two-year 2022 - 2023 term Abs Development Organization for woman and (ADO) has also uniquely gained the membership of the UN Girls' Education Initiative (UNGEI) coalition

PUMANITARIAN AND SECTOR







Overview:

Yemen's population suffers from a shortage of clean water as only 22% have access to safe drinking water and high-quality sanitation services. It is estimated that 3.19 million people - 75% of the population of Yemen need access to clean water and sanitation services to cover their needs. About 8.9 million of them are at high risk due to disease outbreaks caused by water scarcity and lack of sanitation since the escalation of conflict in the country. ADO recognizes that the physical environment where children are born, live and play shapes many aspects of their health, safety and well-being. Children have access to drinking water, sanitation and hygiene services in a safe, clean and secure environment, but in conflict areas it is not the same picture. As a result, ADO improved WASH services, helped people gain access to basic sanitation services, and focused on the most vulnerable populations in Yemen, including the displaced and host communities, people living in areas affected by cholera and malaria, and those most at risk of contracting the novel coronavirus or other infectious diseases, serving by all activities more than 888,808 people.

ADO Self-Funding

WASH program objectives:

Providing sustainable development facilities to the population with water through digging/constructing/rehabilitating water sources and enhancing sanitation services.

Preventing the widespread of epidemics and improve the health conditions by improving people's access to clean water, latrines, and hygiene kits.

Water

Access: To address key issues of accessibility, ADO helps the country to move towards water services that are safe, sustainable and able to withstand climate change, conflict and natural disasters. We work to improve water access in households as well as in institutions, particularly health-care facilities and schools.

Safety: ADO invests in water treatment technologies throughout the supply chain, including in households, to ensure safe storage and chemical removal, and ultimately decrease the risk of contamination.

Sustainability: ADO helps communities participate in setting service standards and tariffs in order to ensure accountability and transparency. Our work with service providers helps to clarify roles and responsibilities, establishing accountability with clear service delivery models.

Sanitation

In emergencies, ADO provides urgent relief to communities threatened by disrupted services and the risk of disease outbreak. We also support innovation in sanitation; improving sanitation technology; ensuring basic toilets are affordable, accessible and safe; and finding effective, sustainable solutions for sanitation challenges that harm people.

- A. Ending open defecation: Ongoing investment in sanitation services by households, communities and governments is necessary to shift community behavior so that 'toilet use by all' becomes the new norm, which is adopted already by ADO since its establishment.
- B. Promoting hygiene behaviors: ADO mobilizing communities through handwashing campaigns, providing hygiene kits during emergencies and supporting schools to build handwashing facilities, ensuring that everyone has the right hygiene products and services within reach.
- C. Strengthening the hygiene sector: ADO works with governments to strengthen policies, institutional arrangements, planning, financing, monitoring and capacity development the fundamental building blocks for sustainable hygiene improvement. ADO continue to develop new strategies and tools to improve key hygiene behaviors, while empowering communities to take their health and well-being into their own hands.
- D. WASH and climatic change: ADO works at the local, national, and regional levels through implementing a variety of solutions to mitigate climate-related risks to WASH systems. This may include reviewing and altering the location or design of a water point or latrine (to make them flood- or cyclone-proof) or technology (deeper boreholes), or promoting renewable energy instead of diesel. Such changes can ensure that the water point or the latrine continues to be functional and accessible for decades, even after extreme weather events. Engaging youth, ADO seeks to integrate climate change into school curricula which focus on behavior change, students also learn how to conserve water.

E. WASH in emergencies: ADO's approach to WASH in emergencies focuses on preparedness in conflict and natural disaster risks. We provide emergency WASH services in over 30 districts, including those affected by armed conflict, natural disasters, and diseases like cholera, and COVID-19. ADO saves lives in fragile contexts by trucking water, treating piped water, repairing broken water supply and sanitation systems, drilling wells, building temporary latrines, providing essential hygiene items and delivering hygiene messages. We help control and prevent infection in homes, schools, health-care facilities and public spaces by collaborating with other sectors and local par







According to the World Food Organization recent reports, the war in Yemen has exacerbated malnutrition rates, as nearly 4.24 million people need urgent food aid to avoid the country from malnutrition diseases, which may lead to catastrophic consequences, especially for children. The food security sector is the safety net for those who are at risk of starvation and lack the ability to secure food for their next day. Based on the studies conducted, the most appropriate ways to meet their needs are through in-kind food baskets or cash vouchers. ADO fully aware that well-nourished children are the foundation of thriving communities and nations. With good nutrition, children develop into healthy, bright and engaged members of their communities; and they are stronger and more resilient in the face of crisis. Together with their families and communities, well-nourished children are the architects of a sustainable and prosperous future. The efforts of ADO aimed to prevent all forms of malnutrition and save lives where preventive measures fell short. This work was supported by large number of technical staff members across nutrition programs in 8 districts, particularly those with the highest burdens of malnutrition.

FSL program objectives:

Restoring the food security of those who have lost it by distributing minimum food baskets and providing livelihood inputs.

Food security in crisis

ADO implements relief activities in case of humanitarian emergencies. Food assistance is provided to meet the immediate needs of the affected people. ADO offers both cash in-kind food assistance as well as cash or food vouchers and food baskets for beneficiaries to spend directly on food items that best fit their needs in the most relevant, effective, efficient, safe and rapid manner possible. With the help of a well-trained staff, we reach those in need even in the most remote areas, using all-terrain vehicles, camels, donkeys and even teleferic when all other avenues are closed.

Sustainable food systems

ADO's programs include activities on the production side, improving agriculture production and processing practices, reducing waste and losses and making efficient use of natural resources. Through diversification of crops, we aim to increase the availability of various food crops for a varied diet. Access to food is further enhanced by addressing constraints in food value chains and food markets, and increasing the purchasing power of beneficiaries through livelihood activities.

Value chain development

ADO provides training on processing and facilitate access of beneficiaries to markets.

Livelihood

Through small entrepreneurship, vocational training, job creation or cooperatives, through microfinance, ADO reached 1,500 HHs and gave them the chance to take matters into their own hands. Many joint income-generating agricultural projects have been implemented between ADO and farmers in Hajjah and Hodeidah.

Cash for work

In order to strengthen the resilience and participation at the Local Level in Yemen (SRPL), ADO Implemented cash for work (CfW) in Al-Houta district, Aryaf Al-Mukalla district, Hadhramaut Governorate, by building a 13.5m length protective wall located behind agricultural lands to reduce the damage to the agricultural lands that could be caused by seasonal streams/torrents passing through the valley, besides rehabilitating of irrigation canals located in Al-Houta and Al-Rashidiya farms.







ADO recognizes that primary health care - integrated programs and interventions across the life cycle, delivered within strong community health systems - is the most sustainable path to achieving its Goals. ADO continued to prioritize emergency health support for Yemeni citizens and vulnerable communities in Yemen throughout 2022, and took immediate steps to include measures to prevent and respond to the Covid-19 within its interventions. During the year, ADO provided support to the 2 highly affected governorates by cholera waves and malnutrition, they improved the quality of primary & secondary health care.

Health program objectives:

Strengthening accessibility of free high-quality health care by vulnerable population groups to reduce childhood death rates.

Primary and Secondary health care

Abs Development Organization for Woman and Child (ADO) gives priority to emergency health support for Yemeni citizens throughout 2021. Immediate steps have been taken during the Covid-19 epidemic in all its interventions. ADO responded to the Covid-19 epidemic earlier during the first quarter of 2020 when it focused mainly on those preventive measures in all its activities in the context of the spread of diseases and extensive damage of the health sector infrastructure due to the war.

ADO made great efforts to improve the capacity of health centers, semi-fixed and mobile health clinics to improve both the access to health care for all cases and health services provided there. It continued to work in the rehabilitation of many health facilities in Hodeidah (in Al-Qanaws, Al-Marawe'a, Zabid, Al-Khoukha and Hais districts). Those health facilities were supported with the necessary medicines and medical supplies along with the sustainable health services. In addition, efforts continued to build the capacity of health workers in Abs and Aslam districts of Hajjah governorate ensuring that the capacity of those renewable facilities is regained and that provision of health services continue even after the completion of the project. Through the rehabilitation of health facilities, the outbreak of epidemics has been reduced and the assistance of the host community and IDPs to receive primary health care has been largely ensured. More than 650 referrals have been conducted and were assisted with cash amounts ranging from \$200 to \$700.





Humanitarian crises are often characterized by limited access to nutritious, safe and affordable food and clean water; disruptions in essential health and nutrition services; and constraints to optimal feeding, care and hygiene practices. The greatest consequences are borne by children, adolescents and women. Wasting and other forms of acute malnutrition pose an immediate threat to children's lives during emergencies. At the same time, stunting and micronutrient deficiencies are often widespread, with devastating impacts on children's physical growth and cognitive potential that endure long after the crisis has passed. Saving lives and reducing suffering is always a priority in humanitarian situations. During 2022, ADO responded to providing nutritional assistance to the children and pregnant and lactating mothers in the affected communities in 9 districts (4 in Hodeidah and 5 in Raymah).

Nutrition program objectives:

Contributing in reducing the impact and severity of malnutrition among U5 children and pregnant and lactating women (through TSFP).

Protecting U2 children and PLW from malnutrition (through BSFP).

TSFP & BSFP programs

ADO provided treatment and preventative nutrition programs; the first program (TSFP) targets those malnourished from PLW and U5 children; PLW 118,120 and 81,768 MAM affected children were benefited from TSFP, in addition to providing HFs with basic support and medical supplies, training HWs, CHVs as for on CMAM protocol, and referral of the SAM cases with complications. The second program (BSFP) which is a preventive activity where in such densely populated areas, PLW and U2 children are targeted. At the end of 2022, 71,281 and 117,520 MAM affected women and children were admitted, respectively.





ADO works to prevent, reduce, mitigate and respond to protection threats, especially towards those vulnerable communities affected by displacement and conflict in Yemen. This is mainly done while alleviating their vulnerabilities and strengthening their adaptive capacities. The selection criteria for beneficiaries, as well as the assistance provided, are based on area-based analysis and prioritization of threats, risks and weaknesses. ADO protection team provides services to the IDPs and vulnerable members of the host community.

In 2022, the deterioration of the economic conditions led to an increase in the number of poor HHs and loss of income. This was reflected in the children's dropping out of education. Besides, the increasing cases of early marriage for young girls due to the exploitation of the financial situation of HHs. As a result, young girls were exposed to health and psychological risks. What's more, the war and the bombing of populated areas has led to the exposure of children to psychological and pathological issues in those targeted areas. Therefore, ADO has established there a program based on three main pillars: Child Protection, Gender-based violence reduction, and general Protection.

Protection program objectives:

Protecting children from being victims or turning violent.

Protecting the most vulnerable members of the society from being victims or criminals as a result of polarization and lack of opportunities.

Child protection

ADO has achieved the principle of child protection through defending children's rights, working to protect their rights, helping them meet their basic daily needs and providing them with opportunities to explore their capabilities. ADO believes that ensuring the rights of children and providing their basic needs form the nucleus of sustainable development for countries. Consequently, ADO provided health, psychological and social support to children and continued on raising awareness about the importance of the child's mental and physical health. ADO stimulated support reintegrating activities represented by friendly spaces and their recreational activities to properly reintegrate children into society. Moreover, it established community centers for girls who are classified as early marriage cases. They were trained, rehabilitated, and were provided with psychological and social support through professional and skill training so that their awareness of their rights is achieved.

Gender Based Violence (GBV)

ADO supports and protects women victims of domestic violence by its self-funded legal and cash assistance. During the year 2022, assistance was provided to more than 1,175 vulnerable cases that include domestic violence, unaccompanied children, orphans, early marriage, and almost 300 protection cases were assisted with cash.

General protection

ADO provided financial support and assistance to the most vulnerable IDPs and members of the host community. 484 people were targeted during the general protection project in 2022.











The education program focuses on supporting Literacy centers and rehabilitation of schools to improve schools' capability to withstand the increased number of students due to the wave of displacement, building and rehabilitating schools, installing solar energy systems, distributing school uniforms, and distributing meals for students. ADO's Commitment to Ensuring Quality Education for Children Affected by Humanitarian Crisis

The Sustainable Development Goals call for all children to complete free, equitable and quality primary education, leading to relevant and effective learning outcomes. ADO works to provide uninterrupted education for every child affected by humanitarian crisis – especially girls, children with disabilities, internally displaced children, refugees and migrants. We help children develop skills to cope with the trauma of crisis, and supply them with learning spaces that are safe, child-friendly and equipped with water and sanitation facilities. Our work builds capacity by training teachers, providing them with incentives, supplying learning materials, uniforms and supporting Governments to reduce the risk of disaster.

Empowering Yemeni Girls through Reflect Methodology and Education Initiatives

ADO is the first organization in the level of Yemen that has girls with the Reflect methodology, this methodology made illiterate women and girls' literate and able to analyze their reality and work on initiatives of improvement as well as it has entered the district of Abs and built 10 schools, opened literacy classes, spread societal awareness and eradicated illiteracy for districts where the illiteracy rate was 100%.





UN reports indicate that the ongoing conflict has increased from IDPs movement to several sites which lack for the most of the basic needs. Such include lack of health services, latrines, water, and spreading of epidemics which made the situation of IDPs even more exacerbated. Consequently, in 2021 & 2022, ADO was keen to ensure preserving IDPs privacy and keeping their dignity that was lost upon their displacement through protecting them from the severe weather and harmful insects as well as distributing them some non-food items (NFIs).

Shelter program objectives:

Minimizing the suffering of the Internally Displaced People (IDPs) and protecting their dignity by providing them the required humanitarian assistance.

Shelter and CCCM

ADO has played a pioneering role in assisting IDPs with safe, dignified, appropriate living conditions, and easy access to essential services. In partnership with UNHCR, it started working in shelter and CCCM activities, on its own initiative and in collaboration with UNHCR. Accordingly, shelter and camp management activities continued to be implemented in a number of projects. Approximately 5,200 mobile shillings were completed in partnership with UNHCR and YHF. ADO continued to implement CCCM activities. It has also established the Camp Management Manual in participation with the cluster in the design work for the transitional shelter from the local materials in Tehama. ADO went on with providing monthly financial assistance for shelter materials to 156 HHs on a continued basis.

Through the camps managed by ADO, more than 14,000 of internally displaced HHs were hosted and have been assisted in electing community committees to participate in the management of the displacement sites. Moreover, ADO, through the Winterization Support Project, has provided cash for shelter to 847 families, and in the year 2022, as many IDPs in Abs district of Hajjah Governorate were suffering due to the demolishing of their shelters as a result of the flash floods and the dangers of climate change, ADO, as a rapid response, assisted 3 households from the host community by rehabilitating their homes together with 3 more other rooms in the area of Abs district. IDPs were also helped by disbursing sums of money (cash for shelter) to 13,795 female and male beneficiaries, which is equivalent to 1,970 displaced household (HH).





Cash for Rapid and Emergency Response:

ADO works on the Rapid and Emergency response towards its targeted groups, especially women, children, and minorities. Therefore, it has allocated funds for emergency response and cash for the needy.

Health:

ADO reached 190 cases in emergency health aid which can be divided into (40 Minor Surgery Assisted Cases - 70 Emergency Assisted Cases "into Sana'a / Al-Hodeidah Hospitals - 80 Tumor Malignancy Cases)

Shelter & CCCM:

ADO distributed Cash for Shelter 76 IDPs.

Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH):

ADO rehabilitated latrines according to the cluster standards reached 40 latrines for 40 HH.

Food Security and Livelihood (FSL):

ADO distributed Cash Assistance in Food Security reached 76 IDPs.

Protection:

ADO provided cash assistance reached 150 VAWG victims at the community level.

As a contribution to the provision of child-friendly spaces, ADO supported Yemen Konouz Association in the Capital Trust - Sana'a.

Education:

ADO rehabilitated Schools "Oqba Bin Nafe School" in Al-Hawk District of Al-Hodeidah Governorate. ADO distributed School bags "Al-Thawrah School" in Abs District of Hajjah Governorate.

Initiative for Charity – 2022

This is an initiative that has been funded and implemented by ADO since 2019 targeting the poor and displaced families by providing them with monthly cash assistance that makes them feel safe, protected and dignified to overcome the hardship and potential impact of getting into famine classification phase.

Through measuring the impact, ADO found a significant impact out of this initiative in terms of preserving dignity from reaching out to others in addition to enhancing the emergency and urgent response to save lives and protect women and children from community violence.

ADO with you initiative

This initiative targets persons with special needs by providing them with cash or in-kind assistance. In 2022 ADO assisted 60 cases of persons with special needs with various types of assistance, including providing treatment, wheelchairs, and/or other tools they need.
